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We have audited the accompanying financial statements of **THE TATA PIGMENTS LIMITED** ("the Company"), which comprise the Balance Sheet as at 31<sup>st</sup> March, 2016, the Statement of Profit and Loss and the Cash Flow Statement for the year then ended, and a summary of the significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's Responsibility for the Standalone Financial Statements

#### 1) General Corporate Information

The Tata Pigments Limited is one of the largest manufacturer of Synthetic Iron Oxide Manufacturers in India producing as per ISI specifications. Its range of products include flooring colours in five colours under the brand name of Tata Red, Tata Black,Tata Yellow, Tata Green, Tata Blue. The Tata Pigments Limited also manufacturer dry cement paint under brand name of Cemplus and Ecocem, water based emulsion paints, distemper, primer, Wallplus Putty, etc.through BPO route over the past decade. It has diversified in to Industrial Decorative and Coating services and has been mainly catering to Tata Steel group of companies.

#### 2) Significant Accounting Policies

#### 2.01 Basis of preparation of Finacial Statements

The financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with the Generally Accepted Accounting Principles in India (Indian GAAP) to comply with the Accounting Standards specified under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013, read with Rule 7 of the Companies (Accounts) Rules, 2014 and the relevant provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 ("the 2013 Act") / Companies Act, 1956 ("the 1956 Act"), as applicable. The financial statements have been prepared on accrual basis under the historical cost convention. The accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are consistent with those followed in the previous year.

All assets and liabilities have been classified as current or non-current as per the Company's normal operating cycle and other criteria set out in the schedule III to the Companies Act 2013. Based on the nature of products and the time between the acquisition of assets for processing and their realisation in cash and cash equivalents, the Company has ascertained its operating cycle as 12 months for the purpose of current and non-current classification of assets and liabilities.

The accounts presentation in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles in India requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and the disclosures of contingent liabilities as at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of expenses during the year. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Any revision to accounting estimates is recognised prospectively in the current and future periods.

2.02 The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Indian GAAP requires the Management to make estimates and assumptions considered in the reported amounts of assets and liabilities (including contingent liabilities) and the reported income and expenses during the year. The Management believes that the estimates used in preparation of the financial statements are prudent and reasonable. Future results could differ due to these estimates and the differences between the actual results and the estimates are recognised in the periods in which the results are known / materialise.

#### 2.03 DEPRECIATION / AMORTIZATION

Depreciation on tangible fixed assets has been provided on the straight-line method as per the useful life prescribed in Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013.Intangible asset are amortised over the estimated useful life of 10 years.

#### 2.04 Cash Flow Statement

Cash flows are reported using the indirect method, whereby profit/(loss) before extraordinary items and tax is adjusted for the effects of transactions of non-cash nature and any deferrals or accruals of past or future cash receipts or payments. The cash flows from operating, investing and financing activities of the Company are segregated based on the available information.

#### 2.05 INVENTORIES

Finished goods are valued at lower of weighted average cost and realizable value. Cost comprises all direct and indirect costs other than interest, corporate expenses and selling and distribution M.S. Scrap, Caustic Soda and other raw materials purchased by the company are carried at lower of cost and net realisable value and is computed on FIFO (First-in-First-out) basis. Stores and spares are valued at cost comprising of purchase price, freight and handling, taxes, duties and other attributable costs and is computed on FIFO basis. Necessary provision is made and charged to revenue in case of identified obsolete and non-moving items. Loose tools are valued at cost and depreciated @ 10% per annum on written down value.

#### 2.06 Revenue Recognition

### i) Sale of goods

The Company recognises revenue on sale of products when the products are delivered to the carriers for Ex-Works. Sales and in case of sale from depots when the products are delivered to the dealer/customer which is when risks and rewards of owenership pass to the dealer/customer. Sales comprises sale of goods, net of trade discount and includes excise duty, sales tax recovered is excluded.

### ii) Income form Services

The company recognises revenue from service transactions that are complited and incase of partialy complited contract the expenses incurred are treated as work-in-progress.

#### iii) ividend and Interest

Divid and income is recognised when the company's right to receive dividend is established. Interest income is recognised on a time proportion basis taking into account the amount outstanding and the rate applicable.

#### 2.07 FIXED ASSETS

The cost of assets comprises its purchases price and all attributable cost of bringing the assets to its working condition for the intended use and includes financial costs relating to borrowed funds attributable to construction or acquisition up to date the assets is put to use. The building and plant and machinery are situated on land leased from Tata Steel Limited. The legal formalities relating to the lease are yet to be completed.

- a) Tangible Assets: Tangible assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and net of impairment, if any.
- b) Intangible Assets: Intangible assets are stated at cost less accumulated amortisation and net of impairments, if any. An intangible assets is recognised if it is probable that the expected future economic benefit that are attributable to the assets will flow to the company and its cost can be measured reliably.

Note 1: Accounting Policies (Contd.)

#### 2.08 FOREIGN CURRENCY TRANSACTIONS

Transactions in foreign currencies are initially recognised in reporting currency i.e.Indian Rupees, using the exchange rates prevailing on the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are remeasured at the rates of exchange prevailing at the balance sheet date.

The exchange differences arising on the settlement of transactions and remeasurement are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss. In respect of transactions covered by forward exchange contracts, the difference between the contract rate and the spot rate on the date of transaction is charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss over the period of the contract. Profit/(loss) on cancellation of forward exchange contracts are recognised as income or as expense in the statement of Profit and Loss.

#### 2.09 INVESTMENTS

Long-term investments are valued at cost. Provision for diminution in the value of long term investments is made only if such a decline is other than temporary. Current investments are carried at lower of cost and fair value.

#### 2.10 EMPLOYEES BENEFITS

#### (i) Short-term Employee Benefits

Short term employee benefits are recognised as an expense at the undiscounted amount in the statement of profit and loss of the year in which the related service is rendered.

#### (ii) Post Employment Benefit Plans

#### **Defined Contribution Plans**

Defined contribution plans are those plans where the Company pays fixed contributions to a fund managed by independent trust. Contributions are paid in return for services rendered by the employees during the year. The company has no legal or constructive obligation to pay further contributions if the fund does not hold sufficient assets to pay employee benefits. The Company provides Provident Fund facility to all employees and Superannuation benefits to selected employees.

#### **Defined Benefit Plans**

The present value of these defined benefit obligations are ascertained by an independent actuarial valuation using Projected Unit Credit Method as per the requirement of Accounting Standard 15 - Employee Benefits. The liability recognised in the balance sheet is the present value of the defined benefit obligations on the balance sheet date less the fair value of the plan assets (for funded plans), together with adjustments for unrecognised past service costs. Any asset resulting from this calculation is limited to past service cost, plus the present value of available refunds and reductions in future contributions to the scheme. All actuarial gains and losses are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss in full in the year in which they occur. Past service cost is recognised immediately to the extent that the benefits are already vested, and otherwise is amortised on a straight-line basis over the average period until the benefits become vested.

### (iii) Other Long-term Employment Benefits (unfunded)

The present value of obligation against long-term employee benefits is ascertained by an independent actuarial valuation using Projected Unit Credit Method as per the requirement of Accounting Standards 15 - Employee Benefits. All actuarial gains and losses and past service cost are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss in full in the year in which they occur.

### 2.11 BORROWING COSTS

Borrowing costs that are attributable to the acquisition, construction of qualifying assets are capitalised as part of the cost of such assets till such time the assets is ready for its intended use or sale. A qualifying asset is an asset that necessarly takes a substantial perid of time to get ready for its intended use. All other borrowing costs are recognised as an expense in the profit and loss account in the period in which they are incured.

#### 2.12 **SEGMENT REPORTING**

The Company indentifies primary segments based on the nature of risks and returns, organisational structure and internal performance reporting systems. The accounting policies adopted for the segment reporting are in line Accounting standared (AS) 17. Segment revenue, segment expenses, segment assets and liabilities are allocated to segments on the basis of their relationship to the operating activities of the segment.



#### 2.13 EARNING PER SHARE

The Company reports basic and diluted earning per share in accordance with Accounting standard (AS) 20- Earning per Share. Basic earnings per Equity share have been computed by dividing net profit after tax attributable to equity share holders by the weighted average numbers of equity shares outstanding during the year. Diluted earning during the year adjusted for the effects of all dilutive potential equity shares per share is computed using the weighted average number of equity shares and dilutive potential equity shares outstanding during the year.

#### 2.14 TAXES ON INCOME

#### i) Current Tax

Current tax is measured at the amount expected to be paid to the tax authorities in accordance with the provisions of the Income-tax Act. 1961.

#### ii) Deferred tax

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are recognised by computing the tax effect on timing differences which arise during the year and reverse in the subsequent periods. Deferred tax assets against unabsorbed depreciation and carried forward loss under tax laws, are recognised only to the extent that there is virtual certainty supported by convincing evidence that sufficient future taxable income will be available against which such deferred tax assets can be realised. Deferred tax assets on other timing differences are recognised only to the extent that there is a reasonable certainty that sufficient future taxable income will be available against which such deferred tax assets can be realised.

iii) Current and Deferred tax is measured based on the provisions of tax laws and tax rates enacted or substantively enacted as at the Balance Sheet date.

#### 2.15 IMPAIRMENT OF ASSETS

The carrying amount of fixed assets are reviewed at each Balance Sheet date to assess if there is any indication of impairment based on internal / external factors. An asset is treated as impaired when the carrying cost of assets exceeds its recoverable value. An impairment loss is charged to the Profit and Loss Account in the year in which an asset is identified as impaired.

#### 2.16 PROVISIONS, CONTINGENT LIABILITIES AND CONTINGENT ASSETS

Provisions involving substantial degree of estimation in measurement are recognized when there is a present obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that there will be an outflow of present obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that there will be an outflow of resources. Contingent Liabilities are not recognized but are disclosed in the notes to Accounts. Contingent Assets are neither recognized nor disclosed in the financial statements.
